Another room was a very large space that could hold around 12cars. This was the tear down and fabricate area. At least 6 Healeys were in various stages of repair. Craig said they can build a car from scratch, if needed. Various presses and rollers were there - things I'd not seen before.

The paint room contained the prep area and the paint booth. I asked if they did routine repairs and maintenance, to which he replied "of course, come with me". We walked back to another area near the showroom. Low and behold, there was a shop that's about 6 cars wide and 3 deep. It contained an in-house Dyno that is computer controlled. They can place a car on the Dyno and run it through its paces without even going out on the road. Amazing!

We spent about an hour with Craig and got the royal treatment. He said they are taking jobs now for delivery in the summer of 2007. By the way, shop rates are \$71 per hour. The only drawback was the 4 1/2 hour drive down there. Out front sat a new Ford flat bed transporter, so I'm thinking he might pick up for you. We did stop at the home of Blue Bunnnies Ice Cream for a treat on the way back - not bad for a couple of old geeks on an adventure! I won't soon forget that BJ8.

Lets go back to the future. Coming up this month: Ellingson's on the 12th, Healey /Morgan picnic on the 13th, the Gymkhana on the 19th, and the Antique Tour on the 27th. Lots of activities for all, and a great chance to strut your Healeys. Wait a minute, I almost forgot PIE on the 2nd! We'll be off to Oregon on the 29th of July and back on the 23rd of Aug. The first annual Amery Airport Autocross and Straightaway Speedrun was a great success. The fastest time of day for the full course was 55.44 posted by Walden Ringwelski in his 1979 Porsche 930 turbo. Fastest time in the auto cross section goes to Paul Weidner driving his 1959 Austin Healey Speedwell Sprite. Fastest Radar gun speed at the finish line was obtained by Glenn Ciegler in his beautiful 2005 Ford GT. He screamed through the traps at 128 mph. We had a total of 76 cars and 253 starts.

All the races were fun to watch, including Andy Lindberg's 2 CV's lean angles, Steve Rixen's slip sliding his big Healey through the auto cross, the smoothly efficient fast Miatas, and the Vipers which were awesome on the straightaway and handled the autocross quite well.

The layout was very good with great spectator viewing of the autocross. The Amery Girl Scouts did a super job of providing us with hotdogs, brats, cold pop, fruit, and of course Girl Scout cookies - all at reasonable prices. The Square Peg provided coffee and goodies to all free of charge - most welcome in the morning.

The weather was not beastly hot, and we even got a pleasant sprinkle in the afternoon to cool us all down. A very enjoyable day!

Forty Four. It's just a number. If I had to put it on something, I'd have thought of the old Group Forty Four race team. Unfortunately I now have another reason to remember that number. That's the age Steve Hendrickson was when his family lost a husband, father, son, brother, and uncle; and we in the motorsports and publishing industries lost a friend.

I don't claim to know Steve well. My friendship with him started several years ago when he purchased a Sprite and started autocrossing. I would, however, like to share a few of my memories with you...

About that Sprite he had, he purchased it already built (rare for him as he was a builder - his first love was Hot Rods) and became involved with the local autocross and vintage Austin Healey clubs. He didn't make all the events as his family and work kept him busy, but he really enjoyed driving the car when he did come out. He was very willing to share it. He let me drive it at an Austin Healey Gymkhana. I think that's the reason I bought my project Sprite.

Steve had a great capacity to enjoy life and share with others. I was frankly quite overwhelmed when I bought my project Sprite several years ago. He came over and custom fabricated an inner door panel and installed a new door latch. Since it had been a race car, the old latch/door structure had been cut out and the door riveted shut. He was meticulous in his work, a true craftsman. While there, he me gave advice on what to do. "Start small, just do a little at a time, and before you know it..." . He had an interesting set of tools and delighted in talking about them. He could make a used sheet steel nipper sound interesting, and the story about how he found it was even better. When we were done, he refused any payment - not even for his time or materials. He said to "pay it forward", as he was that kind of guy.

I've talked about Steve to several members of the local autocross club, and they all mentioned how welcoming and helpful he was. A couple, that started after he did, said he helped show them the ropes and made them feel part of the group. One of my personal regrets is that my car wasn't done before Steve's illness progressed to the point that he couldn't autocross anymore. We'd been looking forward to competing with each other and enjoying our cars together. I did bring my car out for Steve to see this spring and gave him a ride. We visited for a couple hours. This was the last time I saw him. Being Steve, he was upbeat and more concerned with others than with his illness. He didn't dwell on it.

We'll all miss you Steve --- I know you can hear this: I will "Pay it Forward".

TECH TIP: by Doctor Ernie

They say you can't teach an old dog new tricks. Maybe so. But a mechanic doesn't have that umbrella to hide under. No matter what your age or how old of cars you work on, technology moves on. Until just a month ago I thought that Permatex hardening number one and Permatex ultra black would work in all situations that I'd ever run into. Wrong! I've recently acquired a 1975 Jensen Healey with a thoroughly worn out Lotus 907 engine in it. With it came a whole new set of requirements for gasketing. In fact in many instances, no gaskets - just sealers. The reproduction "Factory Manual" spoke in terms and names more closely related to the Old Testament. No products today bear those names, and confusion was magnified because it's a British car with a British manual.

My next step was to surf the Internet regarding this car. After more than six hours, I found out all of the answers you could ask for. Unfortunately, almost all of them disagree or conflicted with each other. So, next I hit the local parts stores. None of those places provided much help - or they made such comments as: "We jes use ultra black". One of the stores did have the anaerobic cement; but when I read the container, it called for a cleaner/activator to be used. When I asked for that, I was informed-------"oh, we don't stock that".

Finally I asked to see their Permatex catalog. At last pay dirt! I was surprised to see the size of that catalog. Those folks have a product to solve about every problem but your uncle's bad table manners. The most useful product I found and needed was a gray product in a tube. It's quite thin, and its primary use is to seal split case situations common in motorcycles, snowmobiles, transmissions, and my Lotus engine. These are metal joints without gaskets. So, this tech tip could have just been shortened up to: ask to see, and read the Permatex Catalog.
