





Camshaft Tech 2

My previous tech article was about the methods used in regrinding a camshaft. This article will be about choosing the grind of that camshaft. The cam controls the heartbeat of your engine, and upgrading the performance profile of the cam will increase the performance of your engine depending on several factors. Let's talk about those factors.

First will be a quick tutorial on the terminology of cam technology. Please take a look at the image below provided by our friends at Comp Cams.



The **Lift** is the difference of the **base circle radius** and the **nose radius** of the cam lobe. If you are upgrading the performance of your engine, the cam re-grinder will reduce the **Base Circle** radius thereby increasing the comparative lift of the **Nose** of the cam.

This reduction will also increase the duration of the cam as the **Valve Opening** event will occur earlier and **Valve Closing** will occur later. The increase of **Duration** means the valve is open longer as well as being open further.


Since the valve is open longer there will also be an increase of Exhaust to Intake valve Overlap.

The increase in lift, duration and overlap changes the way the engine performs. The amount of increase of these three factors depends on how much the base circle can be reduced. So, depending on the amount of wear the cam has suffered during its service will be a factor, as this reduces the nose radius. As stated in the first article, this may require the worn lobe(s) having to have material added by welding, in order to meet your desired cam profile.

BMC cams had very conservative grinds - whether the four cylinder of the 100 and the A series engine in the Sprite, or the six cylinders of the 100-6 and 3000 models. The early cams were usually ground with a cam lift of about 0.220 inch, valve lift of about 0.340 inch when multiplied by the rocker ratio of 1.4:1 and duration of about 236 degrees. The overlap of these cams is about 30 degrees.

As time passed and new models' higher performance was desired, cam grinds were modified up to 0.368 valve lift and added duration of around 258 degrees with 37 degrees of overlap on the BJ8. Duration increased as well - to around 46 degrees. Observe the cam duration diagrams below to see illustration of duration and overlap.

BASE



The cam illustrated has duration of about 270 degrees and an overlap of 60 degrees. The intake valve opening has about 60 degrees of **Crankshaft Rotation** prior to the closing of the exhaust valve. Coincidentally, this cam would be a nice "street" cam in an Austin-Healey Six or 100, if it had been bumped up in compression a bit.

Why the increase in **Compression**? As duration and overlap increase, a loss of compression at lower engine RPM occurs - since the piston is farther up the cylinder before the intake valve is closed on the compression stroke. Observe the BDC line on the graph above. See that the intake valve doesn't close until the crankshaft is almost 30 degrees of crankshaft rotation after the piston is rising on the compression stroke.

As RPM increases, the velocity/mass/inertia of the incoming air fuel mixture overcomes most of the loss of compression apparent at low RPM. But not all! This means that putting a monster cam in your engine actually loses power. Horsepower and Torque is lower at low RPM than with a stock cam. To recover some of the power compression increase by grinding the head to block surfaces or installing high compression pistons is performed.

Pulling into the Healey club meeting, car show, or the drive-in with the engine doing the *rumpa-rumpa* idle associated with a high lift long duration cam is a neat thing to think about. Finding and buying the high octane fuel it takes to keep the engine happy (and not self destructing from pre-ignition) is another.

So, if shelling out the bucks for 110 octane at the local airport or racetrack, and planning all your trips around finding vendors which will sell it works for you - go for that 0.470 lift 315 degree duration Denis Welch cam with 90 plus degrees of overlap and 11, 12 or 14:1 compression ratio it will take to support it. By all means, **dowhatchagottado!**

If not, moderate your desires a bit. Even with all the hot-rodding, you will have approximately the power of a stock modern minivan on tap. Some increase of compression, 9.5:1 or a bit more, valve lift of 0.390 inch (watch out - the exhaust valve overhangs the block deck, and too much lift will bring the valve in contact with the block), and a cam with about 270 to 280 degree duration will be happy on pump premium, and will give you a kick of performance enhancement.

Back in the day, Iskanderian, Edelbrock and others produced cams for the Healeys in this range. If you have or can find one, it is a great way to go. If you can find one increasing the rocker ratio from the stock 1.45:1 to about 1.7:1, it will give you about the same lift and duration profile.

AAA warns E15 gasoline could cause car damage

E15, a higher blend of ethanol and gasoline, has rolled out in a handful of states. But its use in older vehicles is generating warnings from AAA, which says E15 could be harmful to Pre-2012 vehicles.

EPA says E15 is safe for most 2001 and newer cars

Wisconsin Congressman Sensenbrenner agrees with AAA findings.

The AAA says the Environmental Protection Agency and gasoline retailers should halt the sale of E15, a new ethanol blend that could damage millions of vehicles and void car warranties.

AAA, which issued its warning Friday, says just 12 million of more than 240 million cars, trucks, and SUVs now in use have manufacturers' approval for E15. Flex-fuel vehicles, 2012 and newer General Motors vehicles, 2013 Fords, and 2001 and later model Porsches are the exceptions, according to AAA - the nation's largest motorist group (with 53.5 million members).

"It is clear that millions of Americans are unfamiliar with E15, which means there is a strong possibility that many may improperly fill up using this gasoline and damage their vehicle," AAA President and CEO Robert Darbelnet tells USA TODAY. "Bringing E15 to the market without adequate safeguards does not responsibly meet the needs of consumers."

BMW, Chrysler, Nissan, Toyota and VW have said their warranties will not cover fuel-related claims caused by E15. Ford, Honda, Kia, Mercedes-Benz and Volvo have said E15 use will void warranties, says Darbelnet, citing potential corrosive damage to fuel lines, gaskets and other engine components.

Gasoline blended with 10% ethanol has become standard at most of the nation's 160,000 gas stations, spurred by federal laws and standards designed to use more renewable energy sources and lessen the nation's dependence on foreign oil. Pushed by ethanol producers, the EPA approved the use of E15 -- a 15% ethanol-gasoline blend -- in June over objections from automakers and the oil industry. It's been available at a handful of outlets in Kansas, Iowa and Nebraska since July.

EPA stickers affixed to gas station pumps say E15 is safe for use in virtually all vehicles 2001 and newer. (USA TODAY made repeated requests for EPA comment.)

But AAA -- in an unusual warning for a travel organization -- says the sale and use of E15 should be stopped until there is more-extensive testing, better pump labels to safeguard consumers, and more consumer education about potential hazards.

Bob Dinneen, CEO of the Renewable Fuels Association, says E15 is safe for virtually all post-2001 vehicles, based on extensive government-sponsored testing. "We think the (EPA) warning label should be sufficient to notify consumers," Dinneen says. "There are no corrosive issues with E15. If there's an issue with E15 (damaging vehicles) we're going to know about it, and the EPA is going to know about it."

But the American Petroleum Institute says a three-year study conducted by automakers and the oil industry found that E15 is a consumer safety issue for a majority of drivers with pre-2012 vehicles. "Our testing of a range of ethanol levels at 15% to 20% has identified issues about engine durability," API group director and engineer Bob Greco says.

Congressman Jim Sensenbrenner has proposed legislation requiring the EPA to authorize an unbiased study of E15, agrees with the AAA. "(The) findings affirm what we have already heard—E15 causes premature engine damage and voids warranties, even on new models," the Wisconsin Republican says. "Concerns about E15 are not diminishing, they are increasing. That is telling. When an organization like AAA, a nationally trusted source for motorists, calls out the EPA, you would think the (Obama) Administration would listen."

The National Association of Convenience Stores says it's also worried about the effect of E15 on station pumps and fuel lines. "The EPA says it's OK to sell it; but for most retailers, there is too much uncertainty related to consumer demand and liability protection - especially if it's later determined E15 is a defective product or there are problems," spokesman Jeff Lenard says.

Scott Zaremba, who has been selling E15 blends at several of his eight Zarco 66 stations in Kansas since July, says no customers have complained. He's also fueling his 2001 Chevy pickup with E15 blend.

"The same complaints came when 10% blend came in -- the world was coming to an end," says Zaremba, 47. "E15 burns well and has great performance, and four people tell me it gives them better gas mileage. I don't see any major issues with it -- yet."


