# **TECH TIP: Winterize** by Ernie West

As usual I was searching my mind trying to come up with a suitable subject to write about, when in desperation I asked Sandy, a neighbor lady, if she had any ideas. She said; "Well, it's getting cold out". -----DUH----- Why couldn't I think of that.

I know there's been dozens of articles, including some of mine, about preparing your car for winter. But for those of you that are prone to forgetting birthdays, insurance payments, or that the cat is out, like me, this article is aimed at you.

The most obvious thing in preparing for winter is having enough antifreeze in the cooling system. But you should carry it one step further --- is it still clean and able to keep the cooling system clean? I just finished disassembling a Barrett-Jackson Auction 50 to 100 thousand dollar type car that is flawless. Except it had antifreeze that looked like chocolate milk that was allowing more growths to accumulate inside the engine than you see on week-old meatloaf. If its over four years old in a cast iron engine, change it. Shorten that to 3 years if its aluminum. Of course this is a good time to check the belts and hoses too.

The next most important thing is to change the oil. Judge your driving so you do this within 200 miles of putting the car away. Always change the oil after a good drive, while the engine is still warm. This fresh oil will have a minimum of moisture in it and still have most of its antirust properties intact. If possible, kill the engine by fogging the carburetor (this can be difficult with engines that have multiple carburetion) or you can pull the spark plugs and squirt about one half teaspoon of oil in each cylinder. Then spin the engine over for three or four seconds, then put the plugs back in. **DO NOT** start the engine periodically till ready to use it next spring.

Next, I disconnect just one of the battery cables and wipe off any dirt that's on the top of the battery with a water damp rag. (Dispose of this rag in a plastic bag and wash your hands thoroughly to remove any acid.) I don't see any advantage, at least up here in Minnesota, to remove a battery and take it in the house. In fact, being it's a chemical device, I believe it will hold a charge longer outside in the cold. Of course, it doesn't hurt to put a self- adjusting battery charger on it every three months.

Never put a car away with wet brakes, and don't put the emergency brake on. If the storage area is prone to sweating, park the car on top of a plastic sheet. If possible put the car up on jack stands or blocks, or at least air up the tires to the maximum amount that's stated on the tire sidewall. Duct tape up any openings like the tail pipe or air cleaner inlet.

There are a dozen more tricks to protect the finish, chrome, and upholstery, as well as protect against rodents, but I'm not sure how effective each is so I'll leave that up to you to research.

I prefer to either: Drain the gas tank and then run the engine till the carb's empty, or have the gas tank as full as I can get it. I don't like the idea of adding an additive to a half full tank.

Check on your insurance coverage, especially if your car is stored somewhere other than on your own property. Before next spring, I'll cover things you should do when getting your car out.

P.S. Some of these tips apply to other seasonal equipment you might own too.

We left early on Sunday. June had a miserable cold and we had promised to visit our daughter in Whitehall Wi. on the way home.
