TECH TIPS: by Ernie West

Head Gaskets To be more specific, how to not have a blown head gasket.

As simple as it sounds (just bolt the head to the block) it's more than that. And the more sophisticated the engine, the more critical small details become. I recently became the victim of a blown head gasket with my 907 Lotus engine, 230 miles from home naturally. Like in most cases there was no one obvious cause. In my case I'll admit to ignorance. I didn't know specs like the latest torq figures, the latest torq sequence, the correct tool (a torq angle gauge), and the fact that on this engine you DON'T retorque the head after 1,000 miles.

So in summary let me emphasis that you bone up on all of the <u>latest</u> factory specs for your engine. For instance if your factory manual is twenty years old, the factory may have changed its mind (they call it up-dating) several times already. That plus as time goes along head gasket materials change and the old recommendation to retorque the head after a specific time might actually be detrimental. Also using a torq angle gauge is getting to be more and more accepted as the preferred method of tightening head nuts or bolts. Of course the old standard rules of having head bolt holes clean so the bolts don't bottom against rust and having all of the threads clean and properly lubricated (or not) still apply, along with the obvious, that the head and block surfaces must be flat or within factory specs for warp.

And one last thing. If your head has washers under the stud nuts or bolts make sure they all fit and are the correct thickness. I had one oddball washer on one stud right where the gasket blew. Yep, I still don't know for sure why it blew.

Windshield Wiper Blades

Many collector cars have very unique or one of a kind wiper blades. And although maybe hardly or never used, the ravages of sun and time still bring their life to an end. When the thin wiping edge starts to flatten out or worse yet starts to separate, it can allow the metal part to start to rub the windshield. Sometimes as little as one pass back and forth can scratch the glass. Next, where do you find new blades for, such a relic (your neighbors opinion)? If you do find a set, and the bank agrees to float a loan, for something as valuable (the seller's opinion) as they are; they might be 40 to 60 years old, and brittle as glass and ready to self-destruct at first use. Here's what I've been able to do many times on cars I work on. Take the blade to the local parts supply place. If you look at their choice of refills you'll see that there are several widths and groove styles to choose from as well as lengths. I almost always can pick one long refill and cut it to get two shorter refills for my short wiper blades. The cost seems to be the same for a 24" as a 12" refill. If the retaining clips can't be reused, most times a suitable method is accomplished by melting a little burr on the refill support end using a soldering gun, or if the support is metal I'll glue the end piece or opening with black silicon gasket glue. If there are a dozen different types, there should be a dozen ways also to hold the rubber part in place.

UNIQUE AND DIMINUTIVE

On the ride home from Rendezvous, my Bugeye developed a fuel leak when the tank was topped off. The culprit was a bad sending unit gasket. Located on the top of the tank and inaccessible from the boot, the tank must be removed to repair. Also, many years bathed in oil and gas had the effect of stripping the finish from the exterior, so a quick refinishing was in order.

Gasket replaced and tank repainted and installed, I was very surprised that it now leaked from a pin hole on the bottom near the drain plug. Well the interior of the tank is is pitted and there is evidence of previous solder repairs, so maybe it's time to replace it. Apparently the unique style (filler neck welded to the tank) of the Bugeye tank results in a retail price including shipping of approximately \$375.

Steve Rixen and Greg Lauser recommended Gas Tank Renu formerly of Eden Prarie now located in Shakopee. (952)937-0557. A quick phone quote of \$175-\$225 with a lifetime guarantee sounder pretty good, but of course a final price required inspection.

Now diminutive worked in my favor. After inspection the tank was deemed small enough to bring the quote down to \$125. This included exterior refinishing, not part of the deal with a newly purchased tank. Sounds good to me.

Cross Country Caravan 'geared up' to help kids

Minnesota Austin-Healey Club member helps raise \$16,001 for Make-Wish Foundation®

When MAHC member Greg Lauser thinks about June 2008, the highlight is driving his 1967 Austin-Healey 3000 from Prescott, Wis., to San Diego to help raise money benefiting children with life-threatening medical conditions.

Lauser was one of a trio of officers of the Austin-Healey Club of America that drove together to Conclave in San Diego. Along the way, members of several regional AHCA clubs generously supported the club's "Cross Country Caravan for Kids" by raising and contributing \$16,001.

"We were very impressed by the generosity of club members, their families, friends and employers as we drove across the country," Lauser said. "Those contributions provided a good foundation for building added success."

In addition to money already contributed to The Make-A-Wish Foundation, upcoming events planned by various AHCA clubs are expected to raise additional funds for local Make-A-Wish chapters. All money pledged and collected until the end of the calendar year will be used to fulfill wishes of children with life-threatening medical conditions.

"The cross-country drive was a symbolic way of creating awareness and excitement among our local clubs about helping fulfill wishes of children in their own regions," Lauser said. "The Make-A-Wish Foundation has chapters all over the continent for our 46 regional clubs to work with so that funds raised in their own backyards can be put to work there.

"A mock check for the total raised by clubs before and during the drive was presented to Make-A-Wish on July 1 at the Conclave car show. Now, it's time for clubs that haven't already done so to contact their local Make-A-Wish chapters and keep the ball rolling," he said. "Fundraisers during the remainder of the year will be done with or for local Make-A-Wish chapters, so proceeds of local fundraisers will be presented directly to them."

Lauser said that although his regional club's formal fundraiser wasn't be until Aug. 16, club members and complete strangers already had made generous contributions to the June caravan. "Nancy and I were having breakfast downtown at The Boxcar the morning (June 19) I left to meet the other two national officers near St. Louis. Another customer asked if the Healey out front was mine. I told him it was and he said he'd just bought a Healey as part of a collection of cars. He asked about the caravan magnets on the doors of my car and I told him I was leaving on the fundraising drive after breakfast.

"After we chatted a bit longer and I gave him a membership application to join the Minnesota and national clubs, he responded by saying he wanted to get my trip started right. With that, he handed me a \$100 bill," Lauser said. "He certainly made my day."

During the caravan, several local and regional clubs arranged meetings and meals for the intrepid travelers. Before Gary Brierton, a club vice president from Lexington, N.C., left for Vermont, the Corsa Rosa driving club in Winston-Salem, N.C. hosted his AHCA regional club and added their donations. When Brierton and his wife arrived in Bennington, Vt., a "kick-off" event hosted by the AHC of New England was attended by more than 20 members and checks were collected. After arriving back in Charlotte, N.C., the Carolinas and Atlanta AHC clubs fed Brierton and AHCA President Carl Brown and added their dollars to the Make-a-Wish Foundation. After leaving Charlotte, clubs in Tennessee, Kentucky, Ohio and Indiana gave money and hosted Brierton and Brown.

AHCA Vice President of Conclaves Jim Frakes of the Central Indiana club stumbled on an innovative way of raising funds. In addition to friends and employees pledging money for miles he and his wife drove through Indiana, one joker who has worked for him for many year added a special incentive. He said he'd pay an extra \$20 a day for every day Jim stayed away from the office.

When Lauser drove down river from Wisconsin to join Brierton and Brown, he brought along \$1,410 in contributions from MAHC and \$425 from the Midwest Region club, whose members met him for dinner near Savanna, Ill., June 19.

Members of the St. Louis-area Austin-Healey Club hosted the "Three Amigos" for dinner on June 20 in Pacific, Mo. The next day the trio stopped in Jefferson City to capture photos of their cars in front of the Missouri state capitol. While there, a lady approached Brierton and said, "I don't want to offend you, sir, but my granddaughter thinks you're Santa Claus. Would you mind posing for a picture with her?"

Although the woman explained that her granddaughter normally is very shy, she leapt into Brierton's arms when he offered to pick her up. Everyone enjoyed that wonderful moment on the steps of the state capitol – particularly Brierton, who often plays Santa Claus back home in North Carolina.

As the trio pulled off the toll road in Wichita the toll booth operator noticed Brown's Make-a-Wish magnet on the door and told him the organization had granted her son's wish.

"We heard this type story all along the way," Lauser said. "Gary met a Make-A-Wish beneficiary and her grandfather, who is an AHCA member, in Bennington, Vt. In Knoxville, Tenn., where the Smoky Mountain Club was the center of television and broadcast media attention during a gathering there, Carl and Gary met another AHCA member whose grandson had his wish fulfilled by Make-A-Wish. As a result of the Knoxville gathering, the Smoky Mountain club recruited three new members that day.

After overnighting in Wichita, Kan., and Guymon, Okla., "The Three Amigos" were treated by about 15 members of The Roadrunner Club to a New Mexican dinner in Albuquerque the evening of the June 24. The trio left early the next morning for Flagstaff, Ariz., to avoid the increasing heat being encountered.

Up at dawn the next day (June 26), the trio was intent on driving historic parts of Route 66 between Seligman and Kingman, Ariz. They also stopped briefly in Kingman to be interviewed by a reporter for the local newspaper and to take their own pictures before a mothballed steel plant outside of town that Lauser helped establish in the 1990s. From there, it was on to Laughlin, Nev., and down to Lake Havasu City, Ariz., where it was 107 degrees at 1 p.m.

That evening the three were hosted by about 50 members of the Cruisers Club of Lake Hayasu City, an event arranged by Judy and Ted Hardy, who also are members of Utah's Bonneville AHC. The restaurant parking lot was overflowing with classic American Iron and four Austin-Healeys. As the trio and their hosts munched sandwiches in air-conditioned comfort, the thermometer on a bank down the block rose to 114 degrees by 7 p.m.! The next morning, it was on to San Diego.

The caravan tally was \$16,001 raised for Make-A-Wish and zero mechanical problems all the way to San Diego "Ongoing fundraising efforts through the end of the year by local clubs can make the caravan total just the 'tip of the iceberg' for AHCA contributions to Make-A-Wish and we hope that will be the case," Lauser said.

Since returning from California, the Lausers (Nancy) and Betty and Carl Stine hosted and catered the Pierce County Parade & Picnic at the Stine's farm Aug. 16 near Beldenville, Wis. That event, thanks to food costs being underwritten by MAHC, raised an additional \$655 for Make-A-Wish children.
