The first car I ever drove was my brother Dave's '51 Chevy. It was a highly patinaed dark blue, and it had '69 spray painted on the doors and a three on the tree. He drove it down from St. Cloud State for the weekend and showed me how to drive it: clutch, down and back, clutch, up and forward, then clutch, down. I don't remember jerking it around much – I'm sure I did – but I still remember the feel of the clutch and shifter. That was the only time I remember seeing that car. I imagine Mom and Dad didn't want it sitting in the driveway.

My younger brother Steve and I shared two other Chevy's, both pink-and-white 3-speeds OTT. After that a string of slush-bucket Fords and Chevys and a '62 Buick with Dynaflow transmission.

By the end of my schooling, I had been bit by the sporting car bug and celebrated with a lightly used little Colorado orange BMW with a 4-speed. Aside from almost taking off from a stoplight in reverse when I first drove it, I came to always prefer the clutch and stick, and consider myself blessed by a bride who can drive one.

With kids came automatic vans and sedans, improved but unfulfilling. Now that phase is passing, and I live the dream of a more intimate relationship with the drivetrain of a car. Most people nowadays will never understand the impact of shifting with a clutch. My kids don't. Many, if not most, don't even know what a manual transmission is. My nephew has a near-summit Mercedes, and Dave a late-model 911. Both of these cars are automatics and are faster than most any manual-shift cars made. Driving both of them, I came away both awed and a little disappointed. I could do no wrong – in fact, the Mercedes seat actually grabbed (or hugged) me in turns. Like the rear-engine 911, the plan to abandon the manual transmission for speed was voted down by those who know the sensual connection and bond that runs from the foot to the flywheel and the hand to the gears.

We have these cars because we love this stuff. There's joy in exploring and experiencing what our cars are intended to do. A bunch of us came up with the idea of track days, meant to heighten the connection between drivers and their cars. The track experience strips away the distractions of street driving. In just a minute or two, each lap brings the drivers closer in sync with their cars—a connection that extends, in a sense, to the engineers and visionaries who created these beautiful machines.

We're a social group. Let's get together and enjoy driving and talking and watching as we learn and share the fun.

Driving the Healey in a Minnesota Winter by Jim Manion

Austin Healey owners today don't take their cars out in the winter, but back in the late 60s early 70s, my Healey was my daily driver. Surprisingly, it drove fairly well in the snow and ice. And that's back in the day when most cars had rear-wheel drive and skinny bias ply tires. Was it great in the winter? No, but then other cars at the time were not so great either. The Healey had no major problem with traction or braking. However, it did have pronounced understeer, so when making a corner in snow or ice, it wanted to keep going straight. To make a turn you had to slow way down, and since it was so low to the ground it had to plow through snowdrifts. So, you had to avoid really deep snow. I probably got stuck only a couple of times where I needed a push.

Bitterly cold weather was a bigger problem, because of the tubed tires that came with the car. They kept going flat in the cold, and changing a tire along the road with the little screw jack in the winter is not an experience I want to relive. After discussing it, the dealer advised replacing all the tubes with natural rubber tubes. That seemed to solve the problem, but in retrospect he probably also covered the nipples on the spokes, perhaps the real problem. But then again, the problem never happened in the summer, only that first winter.

Another problem was with the SU carbs. They would ice up in cold weather, which prevented the carb pistons from moving. The car would be hard to start, and occasionally in really cold weather the pistons would ice up again while I was driving, and the car would stall and lose power. My mechanic at the time suggested I take a pan of hot water and pour it over the dashpots to free them up. Amazingly, this would get the car going, so I kept a sauce pan in the car in the winter. I recall one instance I was driving east on 194 out of St. Paul when the car started to lose power, so I pulled off the road and drove to a residential area along the freeway. I pulled up to the first house I found and knocked on the front door. A very nice old lady opened it, I gave her the pan and asked her to fill it up with hot water. She never said a word but took the pan, filled it with hot water and gave it back to me. I went back to my car, poured the water over the carbs and was on my way. I often wonder what she must have thought I was doing. Today she probably would have called the police.

Rust of course is the curse of all cars, and especially Healeys. Although I did frequently wash the car, it still developed rust in the rocker panels, floor pans, and dog leg areas. It also had rust on the trunk (boot) floor. In just the second year of ownership, the gas tank had to be replaced because it had rusted out and ruptured while a mechanic was working on the brakes. It leaked gas all over his shop. (He was not pleased). The rust was eventually repaired during the car's restoration, but at considerable expense.

We all like to complain about the "Healey hotfoot," but you wouldn't complain about it in the winter. The car was drafty but surprisingly warm. I could even crack a window. Defrosters generally worked Ok as did the wipers. And it was one of the few cars on the road with a windshield washer. So, aside from the issues above, for its time the Healey was a decent winter driver.

But for a significant part of my life, time limited my focus to photos and the occasional article on my possible next car. That might account for my inability to throw them away. When Lisa discovered what was in the boxes on the shelves in the laundry room, they quickly moved to the shop, where I spent an afternoon reading Peter Egan, David E. Davis, Warren Weith, and Gene Shepard columns, as well as road tests on cars I had owned or lusted after.

A few treasured, worn, and coverless editions from the sixties came from my cousin Gary, who raced a bugeye, Datsun 510, and I think a Nissan on Paul Newman's team back in the day. Those got me hooked. The rest have delivery addresses dating back to my student days living at home and tracking my residences to the present day.

I think these old columns and articles are more interesting to read now than when they were written, probably for the context of the many years that have passed, but also because of a better appreciation of great writing: the hook, the prose, the special common experiences and feelings that the cars bring out, especially those I didn't have the time or resources to experience personally.

Hagerty has the Silverstones running in the \$170K range. I guess stocks would be a better investment.






